THE new owner of the DFO shopping centre at Westcourt will tap into the rebounding tourism sector to capitalise on their new \$39.7 million investment.

The Brisbane-based Sentinel Property Group says the property is their biggest retail acquisition and represents "a major boost to Sentinel's national retail portfolio and its growing presence in the North Queensland property market".

Sentinel managing director Warren Ebert said it was "landmark acquisition".

Revived tourism sector factor in purchase

"This is our largest ever retail purchase in both value and size and also provides us with a high profile entry into the Cairns market," he said. "We have been actively

"We have been actively growing our property presence in North Queensland in recent years and have been searching for a prominent Cairns property to which we can add significant value.

"We are delighted to have secured the DFO Cairns retail centre and we now look forward to working closely with its retailers to maximise the property's solid underlying fundamentals and future growth potential."

Mr Ebert said a recent focus of Sentinel's expansion strategy has been on acquiring property in key locations in North Queensland that were well positioned to benefit from the rebounding tourism sector.

"Sentinel has built its success on identifying and unlocking value where others do not, and we see great potential to capitalise on the size, location and tenancy profile of DFO Cairns with our hands-

on specialist retail leasing and management skills," he said.

"We also believe the property is very well positioned to enjoy the positive flow-on benefits from the rebounding tourism sector in Cairns, already evident in the strong growth in visitor numbers, increased direct flights from China and the major redevelopment of the Cairns airport."

The centre sits on 8.15ha site with a total floor area of 25,000sq m and parking for more than 1500 vehicles.

It is the only direct factory

outlet north of Brisbane and is home to an array of national and international tenants, including Coles, Hungry Jacks, Trade Secret, Bonds, EB Games, Ralph Lauren and

Royal Doulton.
Sentinel's capital raising to buy the centre closed oversubscribed from investors in just 24 hours. The property will be held as the sole asset of the Sentinel DFO Cairns Trust, which has forecast three year average distributions of 10.5

per cent per annum. According to CoreLogic RP Data DFO bought the 8.5ha centre in 2006 for \$45m from Trinity Fund Management Ltd.

It is one of the last DFO centres operated by the failed Austexx group.

Austexx group.

Late last year Sentinel snapped up the property housing Big W at Atherton for \$10.35m.

The unlisted commercial property fund manager, established in 2010, has assets under management of nearly \$1 billion and owns and manages a national portfolio of 42 retail, industrial, office, land and tourism infrastructure assets thousehort Australia.

doing the opposite?



SO now Donald Trump's cold war on women has gone hot with his outrageous suggestion women who end pregnancies should be punished.

In an interview with a US broad-caster, Trump said if abortion is banned in the US there has to be "some form of punishment" for women who terminate pregnancies.

Nothing about the men who helped them get into that situation, just the ladies who make a choice women fought long and hard for; the right to control their own fertility.

The Republican presidential frontrunner has a solid track record of woman-baiting but this is his most flagrant attempt to wind back women's freedoms. It's nothing short of dangerous.

In this campaign alone he has suggested a female journalist who questioned him in a way he didn't like was on her period – "she had blood coming out of her wherever", he said on CNN.

Fox moderator Megyn Kelly's crime had been to ask tough questions of Trump during a televised debate about his past demeaning comments about women in life and on social media; his use of words such as "dog", "fat" and "disgusting" to put down women.

He has dealt similarly cutting blows to other high-profile women who have dared to have a voice and tackle him, including Cher, Bette Midler, Angelina Jolie and Rosie O'Donnell, insulting them as "fat ass", "slob" and "extremely unattractive" among other things.

These women and others who have dared to cross him have been duly "punished" by Trump with mere ritual humiliation based on their looks or gender.

What punishment would he suggest for women who have abortions?

The former reality TV show star turned would-be conservative presidential candidate said "I don't know".

Showing how much he cares about women's rights to make their own health choices, he said that even if abortion is banned some women would access it illegally.

He later tried to backpedal, saying

abortion was an issue for the states – but the damage was done.

What is truly frightening is that a man quoted in New York magazine in the early 1990s as having a philosophy of "women, you have to treat them like s--t" is enjoying such extraordinary popularity in the US.

He has described pumping breast milk at work as "disgusting" and working mothers as lacking in loyalty and not good employees because "she's not giving me 100 per cent. She's giving me 84 per cent and 16 per cent is going towards taking care of children".

What about working fathers?

In Trump-land is parenting such a sole domain of women that fathers don't matter or their need to care for children count?

Anger with what governments or parties have delivered you is one thing, and wanting a candidate who can do more for you and "tells it like it is" as "blunt-talking" Trump boasts is understandable in the era of pernetual spin.

But continuing to support someone whose views on women are so overtly degrading and whose aspirations for controlling women's lives are in some ways comparable to the way women are treated under regimes Trump despises is impossible to understand.

Perhaps this latest broadside on our gender will wake Americans up, at last, to the kind of person this man must be.

To quote the conclusion of a March 24 article titled 'Donald Trump Hates Women, It's The One Position He's Never Changed' in the influential US journal Slate: "Misogyny isn't an incidental part of Donald Trump, It's who he is."

Women voters, please take note.
